

We've worked with people researching a very wide variety of topics including Welsh Baptist history, missionaries in the Congo, conscientious objectors in World War two, Timothy Richard and family history.





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ANGUS OPEN DAY

We held a very successful 'Open Day' in December to encourage college staff and students to come to the Angus, meet the staff and learn about the incredible collections that we hold. A display of some of our amazing treasures was arranged to highlight the rich resources that we have, ranging from the civil war to the medical mission in China, using a dizzying array of material! We had an incredibly positive reaction, with about 60 people attending throughout the day.

There have been a number of talks taking place recently, either in the library or using material from the collection. A talk about materiality of the book for English and History undergraduates, involved discussion of a wide selection of treasures, from the marvellously illustrated Nuremberg Chronicle to the tiny and fragile Nurse True Love's New Year's Gift written for children in the 18th century.

Who knew that our internationally renowned Baptist collection contained so much about crime?

We are delighted to announce that the Centre for Baptist Studies has been successful in their bid for funding from ECLAS (Equipping Christian Leadership in an Age of Science).

The Science for Seminaries project will enable us to digitise material which highlights the important contribution of Baptist women and men to science.

We hope to include items related to William Carey's work in horticulture and botany, Dr Ellen Farrer's pioneering medical work, George Grenfell's contributions to geography and Timothy Richard's interest in scientific advancement. Did you know he ran a competition to make a flying machine in the 19th century?!






Daniel Defore in the Stocks, taken from 'Jure Divino: a Satyr (1706)

It's an excellent way to find out what we have in the collection, including manuscripts and photographs.




DIGITISATION PROJECTS
